Plan Projects to Offset Repetition of Last Summer Shortage

RECORD IN BUILDING

Willowdale, April 2—North York council, at a special meeting yesterday, let contracts for the construction of a deep well and a duplicate water main to service water area No. 1.

"We'll do everything we can to keep this construction through in time to supply plenty of water during the warm months this year," declared Reeve George Mitchell.

Water area No. 1 is in the heart of the township. It includes Willowdale and stretches from Bathurst St. to Bayview Ave.

A booster pump to increase water pressure in water area No. 1 will be installed. This area includes most of the residents on Dufferin St. It is expected this additional pump will greatly ease the terrific drain put on the system by the DeHavilland Aircraft plant, the reeve said.
