



COL. FREDERICK WILLIAM MARLOW, M.D., C.M., F.T.M.C., M.C.P.S.O., L.R.C.P., F.R.C.S., F.A.C.S.

**MARLOW, Col. Frederick William, M.D., C.M., F.T.M.C., M.C.P.S.O., L.R.C.P. (London), F.R.C.S. (Eng.), F.A.C.S.**—Surgeon and Gynecologist, Associate Professor of Gynecology, University of Toronto. Born Township of Cartwright, County Durham, Ont., May 25, 1877, son of Nelson and Ann Jane (Parr) Marlow. Educated: Cartwright Public Schools; Port Perry High and Model Schools; Trinity Medical College; Trinity University (M.D., C.M., F.T.M.C., 1900), Toronto; House Surgeon, St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, 1900-1901; appointed Anaesthetist to the Hospital, 1901; Member, College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, 1901; went to London, England, to pursue post-graduate work in surgery, 1901; studied University College and other London Hospitals; became Licentiate, Royal College of Physicians, London, and Member, Royal College of Surgeons, England, April, 1902; studied, King's College, London, under Prof. Arthur Robinson, in Anatomy, and Prof. Halburton, in Physiology, and passed primary Fellowship examination, November, 1902; continued his studies at King's College, University College, Middlesex, and other London Hospitals, until May, 1903; became Fellow, Royal College of Surgeons, England, 1903; returned to Toronto, September, 1903, and took up the practice of surgery, having previously been appointed Assistant Surgeon to St. Michael's Hospital; appointed Surgical Registrar, Toronto General Hospital, 1904; became Senior Assistant Surgeon, Department of Gynecology, Toronto General Hospital, 1907; a Demonstrator of Anatomy, Toronto University, 1903-1906; Demonstrator, 1906, and Associate in Gynecology, 1909; promoted to Associate Professor of Gynecology, 1913; associated with late Professor J. F. W. Ross in his work in abdominal and pelvic surgery, seven years; has the distinction of performing the first surgical operation in the new Toronto General Hospital, July 15, 1913; one of the founders, Ameri-

can College of Surgeons, Washington, May, 1913; at first convocation received the diploma of Fellow of the College (F.A.C.S.), November, 1913. Entered Canadian Army Medical Corps at its organization, 1900, and has since served in all ranks from Private to Colonel; now commanding No. 1 Clearing Hospital (formerly No. 1 General Hospital) and acting as Assistant Director of the Medical Services, 2nd Division. While studying in England, took a course at Volunteer Ambulance School of Instruction, and obtained their certificate. At the Coronation procession of the late King Edward VII, was given command of an important dressing station on the line of march; has done much to advance the nursing service of Canadian Army Medical Corps. Has published a number of papers on surgical subjects, including the following: "Enlargement of the Prostate Gland," *Canada Lancet*, August, 1904; "On the Surgical Treatment of Gastric Ulcer," *Canadian Practitioner and Review*, September, 1904; "Excision of the Wrist," *Canadian Practitioner and Review*, March, 1905; "Simple Ulcer of the Stomach and Duodenum," *Canada Lancet*, August, 1905; "Hemorrhages after Appendicectomy," *Canada Lancet*, April, 1905; "Kraurosis Vulvae," *Dominion Medical Monthly*, April, 1909; "Unusual Fibroid Tumor of Uterus," *University of Toronto Medical Bulletin*, December, 1912; "Case of Enterouterine Anus," *Dominion Medical Monthly*, 1910. **NEWCOMBE, Hon. Edmund Leslie, C.M.G., K.C.**—Judge of the Supreme Court. Born Cornwallis, N.S., February 17, 1859, son of John C. Newcombe. Educated: Dalhousie College, Halifax (B.A., 1878; M.A., 1881; LL.D., 1911). University of Halifax (LL.B., 1881). Called to the Nova Scotia Bar, 1883; called to Ontario Bar, 1893; created K.C., 1893; received present appointment, March 13, 1893; Canadian Delegate to Great Britain on copyright question, 1905; Chairman of the Select Committee for the revision of the Statutes of Canada, 1902-1906; Associate British Agent and leading Counsel for Canada in the pecuniary claims arbitration between Great Britain and the United States; Prosecuting Officer of H.M. Government for Prize Cases in Canada; Chairman of the Military Service Council, 1917-1918, and Member ex-officio of the Canada Registration Board; Lecturer on Insurance Law, Dalhousie University, 1892-1893; has frequently pleaded before the Privy Council in England; Counsel for the Government of Canada in the S.S. Empress of Ireland Inquiry, 1914; Chairman of Military Service Council to administer Military Service Act, 1917-1919; Deputy Minister of Justice until 1924; appointed Judge of the Supreme Court, September, 1924. Author of a Handbook on the British North America Acts. Presented to King Edward and Queen Alexandra, St. James' Palace, London, July, 1902. Married Annie E. Freeman, daughter of N. Freeman.
