## Anthes awrence Ľ. Foundry Head Formerly Served Industrial Group

Industrial Group Lawrence Lee Anthes, 78, past president of the Canadian Manu-facturers Association, died yes, terday at his home, 119 Dowling Ave. Former president of the Anthes Foundry, established by his father in 1894, he retired sev-eral years ago. Mr. Anthes was born in To-ronto and during the First World Co., Canadian Engineers, with headquarters in Toronto. He held the rank of major and was in charge of recruiting for all tech-nical units, including engineers, Joresters, signaliers and railway construction corps workers for ADD No. 2, from Aug. 1, 1916, until the Armistice. During this period, more than 7,000 recruits were mobilized under his supervision. After the war, he went loi Otlawa in charge of the demoliZation in charge of the densibisment, under the late Si- James Lougheed. He joined the staff of the An-thes Foundry in 1896 and suc-ceeded his father, the late H. W. Anthes, in 1914 as secretary-treasurer. He was appointed president of the company in 1932. Mr. Anther, interrupted his business career to join the reti-

Mr. Anthes Interrupted his business career to join the edi-torial department of The Tele-gram, with which he was associ-aled for three years. He was connected with a number of other companies and served as chair-man of the board of directors of Anthes-Imperial Ltd., Toronto; president and managing director, Anthes Foundry Ltd., Toronto and Winnipeg; chairman of the board of directors, Anthes-Tait Foundry Ltd., Vancouver; chair-man of the board of directors. Imperial Iron Corp., Ltd., St. Catharines; president of Lennox Furnace Co. of Canada, Ltd., New Westimister, B.C. Mr. Anthes was the only Ca-nadian ever honored with the office of president of the Ameri-can Foundrymen's Association. A member of the National Founders' Association of America, he had served on the administration council. He had been keenly interested

served on the administration council. He had been keenly interested in the work of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association for half a century. In 1917 he was elected chairman of the To-ronto branch, and in 1926 was made chairman of the Industrial Relations Committee. In 1933 he became president of the CMA and in 1952 was elected a life member. His clubs included the Engi-neers' Club of Toronto; Military Institute, Royal Canadian Yacht Club, Albany Club, Laurentian Club, Ottawa; Carlton Club, Win-nipeg, and Winnipeg Golf and Country Club. Mr. Anthes was keenly inter-ganized a dramatic club, which produced several light operas. He evas one-lime superintendent of the Sunday School, St. John the Evangelist Church. He leaves a duaghter, Jane McLean Anthes, and two sisters, Mrs. Herbert Locke, and Miss Libbie Frances Anthes.
