## TRAVEL BY RAILWAYS HEAVIEST THIS SEASON

**Trains Operate in Sections to Carry Labor Day Crowds**

"Holiday travel over Labor Day on Canadian National lines has proved the heaviest experienced so far this season," stated W. J. Moffatt, Assistant General Passenger Agent, after checking up on equipment used yesterday. "The Canadian National Exhibition proved a huge magnet for many thousands of travelers, coming long distances in many cases.

"The International Limited operated in four sections between Montreal and Toronto on Saturday night, and operated in three sections out of London

going east. The Confederation Limited leaving for the West on Saturday night was also in two sections, and carried extra equipment for the accommodation of the many holiday-makers returning home.

"Trains on the northern divisions arriving in Toronto on Sunday and Labor Day were similarly heavily equipped and practically all local trains carried a heavy complement of passengers.
