The vendor was Irving J. Isbell, Montreal broker, who purchased the property from Mrs. Della Marie Stair last May for \$325,000, and has now sold it to the present owners for \$364.-000. At the time of the purchase last May, it was announced that the theatre would be demolished and replaced by a sixteen-storey office building for which plans had already been drawn up by N. A. Mrs. D. M. Stair, who sold the Empire theatre last summer to the Montreal syndicate, is in Detroit and could not be reached. 


