Cuba, to General Shatter on July 17, 1898, has been further envenomed by the appearance of a fresh batch of messages, which demonstrate that the Government, when it found that Blanco was unalterably opposed to surrender, communicated directly with General Toral, the Commander at Santiago, giving him a free hand to make terms.



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
